Ash Wednesday

Lent begins with a solemn call to fasting and repentance as we begin our journey to the baptismal waters of Easter. Now is the acceptable time to return to the Lord. Let the people of God reflect on the meaning of our baptism into Christ's death and resurrection. The sign of ashes suggests our human mortality and frailty. What seems like an ending is really an invitation to make each day a new beginning, in which we are washed in God's mercy and forgiveness. With the cross on our brow, we long for the spiritual renewal that flows from the springtime Easter feast to come.

★ CALL TO REPENTANCE based on Joel 2

- Blow the trumpet! Sound the alarm!

 The Lord said: "It isn't too late; you can still return to me with all your heart.

 Don't rip your clothes to show your sorrow; instead, come with broken hearts."

 Sound the trumpet! (Pause for trumpet) Call the people together.
- **A** God's people have been called to GATHER.

No, when you do your good deeds to help people in need, don't even let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be secret. INVITATION TO THE IMPOSITION OF ASHES AND COMMUNION

SHARING COMMUNION (AND ASHES) WITH YOUR HOUSEHOLD

Please approach the altar using the diagonal aisles and return by the side or middle aisles.

You will be offered a wafer, which you may dip in either the chalice of wine or the white grape juice.

You may also choose a packaged cup with wine or grape juice, or a gluten-free wafer with wine.

At home commune each other/yourself with these ancient words of promise:

"The body of Christ for you" and "The blood of Christ for you."

If you desire to receive **ashes**, proceed to the altar rail, where you may kneel or stand.

If you use ashes at home, apply them to the forehead of each person with the words:

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."
